Special Operations Executive (SOE)

Formed by Hugh Dalton, Minister of Economic Warfare on 22 July 1940, to conduct espionage, sabotage and reconnaissance in occupied Europe against the Axis powers, and to aid local resistance movements. Its foundation reportedly came after the new Prime Minister, Winston Churchill, told Dalton to "set Europe ablaze".





For security purposes, it was often known as the "Inter-Service Research Bureau" and its staff referred to it as "the firm" or "the racket".

Structure and strength of SOE

- Operated in all countries or former countries occupied by or attacked by the Axis forces, except where demarcation lines were agreed with the Soviet Union and United States. It also made use of neutral territory on occasion, or made plans and preparations in case neutral countries were attacked by the Axis.
- The organisation directly employed or controlled just over 13,000 people, including some 3,000 women.

Born Yolande Unternährer, 28 October 1911 in Paris, laughter of Swiss parents and took their nationality, but only knew Switzerland through holidays as she rew up, with her two sisters, in Paris.

amily moved to England in 1929, settled in north-west ondon. On finishing education, fluent in English, Italian and rench, set up in business, working with her mother, as a esigner of children's clothes, operating from a shop at 272 amden Road, London NW1 and living in nearby Highgate.

rn Paris 21 January 1916, the daughter of Jacques Henri Bloch and Suzanne telle Lévy Bloch (née Strauss); three brothers; French Jewish family. Family oved from Paris to Lyons in July 1942 - life in the capital had become too ngerous for a Jewish family, despite a change of name to Barrault.

enise worked as a secretary at the Citroën works for Jean Maxim Aron (*Joseph*) no was already active in the *Résistance*. Aron's group were in touch with Foction agent Lt Henri Sevenet, another former Citroën employee in Lyons and a cutenant of Capt Philippe de Vomécourt. Worked with W/T operator Capt Brian onehouse, Denise lucky to avoid capture when Stonehouse arrested October 42.

rsonality clash with Sevenet (Denise almost executed) - sent to work with ptain George Starr and WHEELWRIGHT circuit.

d of April 1943, further arrests in Toulouse area, so sent out over Pyrenees in a -hour trek. To Britain via Spain, Gibraltar and Portugal. Arrived England 21 May 43, security-cleared at RVPS women's section in Balham.

Returned to Ravensbrück 5 October 1944. Denise, Lillian and liolette left again on 19 October 1944 as part of another work party to Königsberg on the Oder river where they were made to undertake hard physical labour in the forests and to help build an aerodrome.


On or about 21 January 1945, the three agents were recalled to Ravensbrück. All three women were in poor physical condition after several months of hard outdoor labour in severe weather conditions. All were still wearing the clothes in which they had been captured.

Transferred to zellenbau, isolated semi-bunker prison block.

Not seen again.



Lieutenant Andrée Raymonde **BORREL** Résistance → WTS (FANY) → SOE





Early life

Born 18 November 1919, Paris into a working class family. Grew up as an 'outdoors' girl and her sister Léone described her as a tomboy (un garçon manqué).

Left school at 14, worked as a shop assistant.

Late 1940 qualified as a military nursing auxiliary.

Came into contact with Résistance.



Andrée worked for the PAT escape line of Captain Ian Garrow (left) and Albert-Marie Guérisse, alias Lieutenant Commander Patrick Albert O'Leary RN.





Sheltered allied escapers and evaders in the Villa René-Thérèse, and then the Villa Anita, at Canet-Plage, a popular sea-side resort near Perpignan and one of the last safe houses before the arduous and dangerous crossing of the Pyrenees. December 1941, many of the Line's northern personnel were betrayed and arrested and by February 1942 it was time for Andrée to leave the country she and her lover crossed the Pyrenees and made their way via Spain and Portugal to the British Embassy in Lisbon.

Flown to England by flying boat on 24 April 1942 and was interrogated and security-cleared in Balham on 27 April 1942.



raining

ne of very first women to be trained by SOE, sent straight to a Group B nishing school course at STS 31, The Rings, Beaulieu, in June 1942 as it as not considered that a courier role necessitated lengthy training. ommandant's report:

Of sound intelligence, if somewhat lacking in imagination. She has little rganising ability and will do her best work under definite instructions. The is thoroughly tough and self-reliant with no nerves. Has plenty of ommon sense and is well able to look after herself in any circumstances and she is absolutely reliable. Has lost her attitude of over-confidence and has benefited enormously from the course and developed a noroughly level headed approach towards problems. A very pleasant ersonality and she should eventually develop into a first class agent".

At 01:00 hrs on the night of 24/25 September 1942, Andrée Borrel became the first woman agent to parachute into occupied France, followed seconds later by fellow-agent Lise de Baissac.

Denise was to serve as courier to the PHYSICIAN/PROSPER
Circuit of Major Francis Suttill (below right)







Though sent as a courier, Andrée acted as a co-organiser to Suttill who later sent a message to London:

"Everyone who has come into contact with her in her work agrees with myself that she is the best of us all.....shared every danger....an imperturbable calmness. Thank you very much for sending her to me".

Andrée served for 9 months in the field.


'24 June 1943 Andrée was arrested in Paris, along with one of circuit's W/T operators, Gilbert Norman. Imprisoned in snes prison on the outskirts of Paris and taken for interrogation the Sicherheitsdienst (SD), the Intelligence Service of the SS, to avenue Foch.

th May 1944 taken to the civilian women's prison at Karlsruhe, rmany along with several other women agents.

July 1944 transferred to Natzweiler-Struthof in Alsace, the y extermination concentration camp on French soil. That night, gether with three other women - agents Vera Leigh and Diana wden and a Résistance helper of French Section, Sonia chanesky, given lethal injection of phenol. Bodies immediately emated in the camp's cremator.

orn a British subject in Ealing, west London, on 4 June 1918, the aughter of Jewish parents who had lived in France before coming England, but who were both originally from Russia. Moved to ermany and France before returning to England in 1930, educated Lycée Français in London.

oved with mother to Torquay, helped with sending children erseas to USA, voluntary work, ARP warden etc.



The operation had, however, been arranged by the Germans as part of their *funkspiel* using the aptured set of Noor Inayat-Khan. Antelme and ee were therefore immediately arrested as they anded.



orn Cicely (NOT Cecily!) Margot Gordon, 30 April 1899 in ayswater. The illegitimate daughter of a ménage à trois that candalised Victorian Britain and made worldwide news. pent formative years in France. Became a nurse and tended rench soldiers in WW1. Met French military doctor, Dr Alix efort, 10 years her senior. Married 1924. Lived in Paris and n the Brittany coast.

Dr Lefort called up by French Army 1940, Cicely came to Britan in 1940, leaving her husband behind. Joined WAAF.

January 1943, keen to return to France, joined SOE.

Aged 43.



Cammaerts later described Cicely as one of French Section's most serious mistakes, "a shy woman who was just completely lost."



Travelled extensively as a courier, but arrested in Montélimar in September, 1943, only 13 weeks after her arrival in France.

February 1944 sent from imprisonment in Paris to Ravensbrück concentration camp. Developed cancer in autumn 1944, but operated on by camp's SS doctor.

Late January/early February 1945, seriously ill, believed gassed at the Jugendlager adjacent to Ravensbrück.

Ensign Vera Eugenie LEIGH Résistance → WTS (FANY) → SOE

orn Vera Glass, 17 March 1903 in Leeds.

bandoned by parents soon after birth, she was adopted by n American racehorse trainer who owned stables at Maisons affitte near Paris.

arly ambition to become a jockey, but after completing her ducation worked as a dress designer. In 1927 she went into artnership with two friends to establish a 'grand maison' fashion house) in Paris.

After the fall of Paris in 1940, left for Lyons to join her fiancé. Became involved in the Résistance, helping to run an escape line for Allied servicemen trapped behind enemy lines.

In 1942 she used the same escape route to cross the Pyrenees into Spain but was arrested and imprisoned for several months at the Miranda de Ebro internment camp. Released with assistance from a British Embassy official, went on to England via Gibraltar.



May 1944 transferred to Karlsruhe prison in Germany.




6th July 1944 transferred to Natzweiler-Struthof concentration camp. That night, together with three other women - agents Andrée Borrel and Diana Rowden and a Résistance helper of French Section, Sonia Olschanesky, given lethal injection of phenol.

One of the women, identified by Vera Atkins as possibly Vera Leigh, reported to have resisted and regained consciousness when being placed in the camp's cremator - and to have scratched the face of one of the SS staff - Peter Strauß - before dying.







ducated in France to the age of 16, finished schooling in Brazil when amily moved to Rio de Janeiro for father's business interests.

Vorked in the British Embassy in Rio, eported to have helped observe serman shipping movements in the arbour.



February 1943, left Brazil for UK, via USA, to join British armed forces. Ship 'Highland Brigade' hit a mine.



Arrived UK April 1943, joined WAAF. Trained as W/T operator in Blackpool and then served at RAF Bicester in Buckinghamshire.

Volunteered for SOE in latter half of 1943.



One of the three French Section women agents (the others were Violette Szabó and Denise Bloch) sent to the women's concentration camp at Ravensbrück, 95 kilometres north of Berlin, arriving there on 22nd August 1944.



After several months and having been sent on two working parties, the three agents were returned to Ravensbrück on or about 21 January 1945.

Three or four days later they were moved to 'the bunker', a segregated semi-underground block of solitary confinement cells that could not be seen from within the camp.




They were never seen again and none of the other inmates of the camp knew what had happened to them.












Early Life

Born Yvonne Cerneau 11 January 1897 at Maisons-Laffitte, some 20 kilometres north-west of Paris. French national. Father was horse trader for French Army, whenever Yvonne's convent education allowed, he took his young daughter with him, including to army units in French North Africa. When he died of pneumonia Yvonne, still in her teens, left for England and obtained a job as a saleswoman in the Galeries Lafayette, the French-owned department store then in Regent Street, London. Subsequently lived with mother in Pimlico. Married Alex Rudellat, an Italian, in 1920. Ill-suited to her husband. Daughter born 1922.

Training

Did not attend paramilitary or any initial assessment. Straight to Finishing School at Beaulieu, STS 31, Boarmans: "She is an intelligent and extremely sensible woman.....She is extremely thorough and sincere in anything she does....She has a somewhat weak memory and might act impulsively in an emergency. A cheerful and attractive personality."

Courier to the MONKEYPUZZLE circuit of Raymond Flower.

Landed by sea on south coast of France, 30 July 1942 - the first woman SOE agent to land in France.

December 1942, Flower returned to Britain and Yvonne then worked for a locally-recruited helper, Pierre Culioli.

Seriously wounded and arrested 20 July at Dhuizon.


Transferred to Fresnes and then to Bergen-Belsen concentration camp. Died there, 23 or 24 April 23 April 1945 from exhaustion, shortly after the camp's liberation by the British Army. Had been able to hide her true identity and was still considered a Résistance helper, rather than a British agent.





But what happened to Violette - and to Denise Bloch and Lilian Rolfe, who had disappeared at Ravensbrück concentration camp?

Denise, Lilian and Violette had returned to Ravensbrück from a working party on or about 21 January 1945.


Moved to the 'bunker block', the zellenbau, three or four days later. Not seen again.







uth discovered by Vera Atkins in her exhaustive research 1945 and 1946 into the fates of SOE agents.



kins interrogated Ravensbrück's camp overseer and second-command, SS -Obersturmführer Johann Schwarzhüber bove) who told how the three young women had been called from Konigsberg work party following receipt from erlin of an order for their execution.

e order was issued by Gestapo headquarters in Berlin and unter-signed by Ravensbrück's camp commandant,

Sturmbannführer Fritz Sühren.



about 19:00 hours one evening (believed to be between 25 January d 5 February 1945) the three women were brought out of their lls and into the courtyard adjacent to it and the crematorium. ports suggest that Lillian had to be carried on a stretcher, that nise was so weak that she had to be helped to walk, d that Violette alone was able to walk to her death unaided.

whren read out the execution order to the girls and one of the nree SS NCO's, SS-Sturmann Schult (or Schulter), shot each girl, rought forward singly, using a pistol.

ne camp's doctor certified death and the bodies were nmediately taken, one by one, into the camp's ematorium and burned.



ühren and Schwarzhüber both caught at the end of the war nd in 1946 tried by the British in Hamburg, their charges ncluding responsibility for the deaths of Lillian Rolfe, Denise sloch and Violette Szabó and also of Cicely Lefort who had eparately disappeared at Ravensbrück.

S-Obersturmführer Johann Schwarzhüber hanged in May 947.

S-Sturmbannführer Fritz Sühren managed to escape from critish custody before trial, but was re-arrested under an ssumed name by the US authorities in 1949 and handed over the French who were then conducting another Ravensbrück rial.








Brookwood Memorial 1939-45, Surrey









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
